Comments to the Author

This is the timely topic due to the rise of urban Muslim middle-class in Indonesia as exemplified by the conspicuous Shariah-approved lifestyle, of which quality Islamic education is part. The author does make a novel contribution by linking the rise of the Muslim middle-class to its socio-political prominence, best exemplified by the Aksi 212 that saw the imprisonment of the former governor of Jakarta, Ahok.

I feel the article adequately discusses relevant literature on the particular topic. My suggestion is for the author to add examples from primary documents such as the curriculum of Sekolah Islam to further buttress his/her argument. Curriculum of Sekolah Islam can be attained from Jaringan Sekolah Islam Terpadu (JSIT), a network of hundreds of Sekolah Islam across Indonesia.

The author presents a persuasive argument overall though it can be made more salient by adding some clarification and elaboration. For example, author can put some emphasis on the specific ways Sekolah Islam indoctrinate students outside of classroom through various extracurricular activities. I also feel there has to be a short explanation on what does "integrated curriculum" or the "Islamization of knowledge" mean in Sekolah Islam. It is a topic well covered by Ismail al-Faruqi, Syed Hossein Nasr, Osman Bakar, among others. Finally, it is not clear to me why parents who send their children to Sekolah Islam are okay with sending their children to pesantren kilat, Quranic recitals taught by pesantren graduates, and also expose them traditional Islamic rituals such as panjang mulud, tahlilan, ziarah and 20 rakaat tarawih prayers. These after-school programs and traditional rituals are antithetical to Sekolah Islam's Salafist ideology, so I'm wondering if the parents are oblivious to the ideological differences or they don't subscribe to the Salafist ideology or simply see it as a way to gain a well-rounded Islamic education? It'd be good if the author can clarify this in the article.

Reviewer: 2

Comments to the Author

This paper successfully argues that Sekolah Islam (private Islamic schools under the Ministry of Education and Culture (MOEC)) have become popular in Serang, a city near Jakarta in West Java, because they symbolise the new identity of recently-made, middle class, urban Muslims.

Altogether the paper presents a useful picture of the intersection of a certain, increasingly common variant of modernist Islam and education in Indonesia, and deserves to be published, but I would like to see it made richer, more nuanced and complex.

The main shortcoming of this paper is that there is no "student voice" or dissenting voices. By only interviewing parents and adult "custodians" (such as the ustadz (teachers and preachers)), the paper is prefigured to present the ideal: we only hear about why parents chose that school, what it represents to them and how those who are invested in it (the custodians) see it. I know this is what the paper aims to do, but the message is very simple and mono-vocal, and I feel that a much richer paper might have been possible if students or, say, the parents of the 'badly-behaved' neighbourhood children (p.14) who patronised other types of schools had been interviewed. Many middle class children attend well-regarded, state, non-religious schools (which still teach Religion, by law), and I would be curious to know how they regard the Sekolah Islam. I have been to Islamic schools where parents sent their children because they thought it provided a safe and moral environment, taught them Islam and protected their children from undesirable global (Western) popular culture, but some students were actually being 'badly-behaved', so the stated ideal was being undermined in practice (at least by some). This would not have detracted from the main message of the paper, but would have provided more "thick description" (it's a bit "thin": it is not until p. 9 that we start to hear about the actual schools, and that is over by p.16) and a more nuanced picture. Also, I would like to have heard more about the political affiliation or identity of parents and "custodians" – is PKS popular among this group? The author/s claim that Sekolah Islam are at the intersection of religion, politics and education, but the politics seems a bit neglected.

There are some hints that the picture is actually not so simple. The same parents who send their children to Sekolah Islam also allow them to attend night-time pengajian in the neighbourhood, pesantren kilat (lightning Islamic schools) and other activities during Ramadan where their children are exposed to non-"true Islam" practices – i.e. local community rituals, prayers and other activities that are Islamic but could be perceived as deviant by Sekolah Islam. The author/s comment that this teaches children religious tolerance and to respect religious diversity – but that same religious tolerance and diversity is not at all advocated by Sekolah Islam – in fact they would decry it. Does anyone talk about this apparent contradiction? When both parents work full-time, one wonders if the baby-sitting functions of the Sekolah Islam and the pesantren kilat are not an important part of the picture.

The paragraph that starts at the bottom of p.2, 'On the basis of the materials, I argue..." posits 'a reciprocal relationship between "local Islam" and "foreign Islam" as seen in Islamic education'. I don't see the situation as depicted in this paper as a 'reciprocal relationship' between local and foreign Islam - in fact it seems somewhat oppositional, if by 'local' the author is referencing the 'traditional' long prayers, panjang mulud and rituals referred to elsewhere. Also, the author tries to run an argument that there is 'a quest for social order' among the new middle class Muslims but I don't see that evidenced in the paper.

- p.3 'Populism is an array of "political discourses and strategies that aim to rupture
- institutional systems by polarizing society into two antagonistic camps" (De la Torre 2019: 8); in the context of Indonesian Islam, the camps are primarily divided into traditionalists and modernists.' In the subsequent discussion of Islamic populism in Indonesia, this division is not mentioned – and should be deleted here.
- p.6 'For instance, in the 1982-83 development budget, education was the largest single item (Dick 1985: 91).' This is not the best way to show the New Order success with education.
- p.6 'the emergence of new administrative regions has contributed to—in addition to popular Islamism and Islamic populism—the growth of the Muslim middle class' I don't quite see that causal connection - not demonstrated.
- p.7 The para beginning 'In the Indonesian context, there are Muslim modernists...' is a bit of a mess. Re-do.
- p.8 'The lower numbers of the students compared to the higher numbers of Sekolah Islam show that many parents cannot afford the high school fees charged by Sekolah Islam' - Actually no, the lower numbers do not in themselves show this. You would need data on the number of students at the different levels, and the costs at each level, to show

this, and even then it might be a coincidence. You would need some verbal proof – parents actually telling you that they didn't send their teenage children to Sekolah Islam because it was too expensive.

Minor infelicities of English: this is a sample from pp.1-5. More extensive proofreading of English would be needed.

p.1 'A recent survey indicates that religion means very significant to

most Indonesians.' Rewrite.

p.2 'dates fruits' Delete fruits

'secondary-levels' Delete hyphen

p.3 'influenced mostly by the nineteenth century Middle Eastern thoughts e.g. those of Muhammad Abduh and Rashid Ridha, who had been politically marginalised by the old administration' Sounds a bit odd – rephrase 'thoughts' (thinkers?)

p.4 'posses' - spelling error

- 'righteousness and terrorist cells, those that' Punctuation
- 'partisipation' spelling error
- p.5 'a new camp consisted of urban modernist Muslims working in academia, NGOs, and Muslim social organisations, appeared to advocate' - insert 'that' after 'camp'
- 'come from newly urbanised middle-class families (Hasan 2006: 219) in which many of them' -rephrase
- 'such as the Banten Province' delete 'the'

Comments to the Author

- Indonesia is not the only country facing the rise of religious conservatism. This should lead author to look at what happens in other societies especially in Muslim societies. By doing this, I assume the author can then justify why researching on an Islamic institution, such as Sekolah Islam can help understand social transformation taking place in Muslim societies. Author should include existing literature that discuss the history of Islamic educational institution in Indonesia which is currently absence in this article. The author argues that Sekolah Islam is a product of 'foreign Islam'. What do you mean by foreign? The article mentions several times about foreign and local cultures and argues that unlike pesantren, Islamic schools are influenced by 'foreign' Islamic cultures because it is strongly influenced by salafism. Does the author think Islam is not 'foreign' to Indonesia? This is to me is a huge problem. To tackle this problem, the author should include existing literature that analyse Indonesian Islam, the history of Islamic educational

institutions. It also does not provide adequate analysis on the category of urban - middle class? In Indonesian context how would urban and middle class is defined. Since this seems to be the central point of the article, the author needs to carefully define and discuss terminologies that are used in this article; including what does it mean with urban middle class, identity politics, true Islam, foreign vs local. I have provided more comments directly into the texts. Please see attached. The article has the potential to be developed further.

- Writing is not clear. It is not well structured. Introduction needs to be restructured It does not discuss its research questions clearly.
- At this stage, the article does not contextualise its focus on Islamic schools to the global and regional development in regards to the role of Islamic education institution. It would benefit from a comparative analysis on the place of Islamic schools in other socio-cultural and political context. Then it will fit better into the scope of TRaNS.

Thank you for your inquiries. Please allow me to answer your questions as follows:

1. Is it a normal procedure at TRaNS to have 3 reviewers instead of 2 reviewers, while the first 2 reviewers already recommended publication (unless among the 2 reviewers, 1 was against publication, so that the third reviewer's comments would be sought)?

Even though reviewers recommend publications with revision, we, editors, usually want the same reviewers to go over the revision and see if the revision is publishable. However, in your submission this case, unfortunately the two original reviewers declined to read it again. Therefore, we had to send it out to other external experts on this issue to see their feedback. Also, we go through the internal review process to make a final decision. The third reviewer had some very different take on your submission and we wanted to see your responses to the feedback. You can have conversations with the reviewer and how you think the reviewer's take is not really fit into your work. If you find some of the reviewers' feedback convincing, you may want to consider taking them in the revision. Editors want to see the conversation for the final decision.

2. If I follow the third reviewer's suggestions, how many more rounds do I have to undergo before I have my paper published?

In case you want to respond to them, please send the draft and your response. Editors internally will see and ask the same reviewer to take a look at it again and listen to them. However, the reviewers' suggestions are suggestions, not final decisions. Final decisions are upon editors.

- 3. If I follow the third reviewer's suggestion, will it be the last? We can decide whether we want to accept it, ask for a few more minor revisions, or reject after reading the draft.

Reviewer 1

This is the timely topic due to the rise of urban Muslim middle-class in Indonesia as exemplified by the conspicuous Shariah-approved lifestyle, of which quality Islamic education is part. The author does make a novel contribution by linking the rise of the Muslim middle-class to its socio-political prominence, best exemplified by the Aksi 212 that saw the imprisonment of the former governor of Jakarta, Ahok.

Reviewer 2

This paper successfully argues that Sekolah Islam (private Islamic schools under the Ministry of Education and Culture (MOEC)) have become popular in Serang, a city near Jakarta in West Java, because they symbolise the new identity of recently-made, middle class, urban Muslims.

Altogether the paper presents a useful picture of the intersection of a certain, increasingly common variant of modernist Islam and education in Indonesia, and deserves to be published, but I would like to see it made richer, more nuanced and complex.

It seems to me that Reviewer 3 does not see my arguments and data I presented as a whole piece of the growing trend of Islamic identity politics in Indonesia, but rather view it as a separated small puzzle fragment. With your suggestion "You can have conversations with the reviewer and how you think the reviewer's take is not really fit into your work. If you find some of the reviewers' feedback convincing, you may want to consider taking them in the revision. Editors want to see the conversation for the final decision", I will make some responses to the reviewer and have some conversations with her/him, and will certainly take her/his convincing comments in the revision.

Therefore, I will make a necessary revision and go with your time table to have a timely publication, i.e. send it by 20 May 2021.


